Reflection for Fourth Sunday of Easter Year C

"I love my job!" exclaimed the farmer. "All you do is boss me around all day!" complained one of his sheep. "What did you say?" challenged the farmer. The sheep glared back and growled... "You herd me."

The fourth Sunday of Easter is sometimes known as the Good Shepherd Sunday. Today we do not read about the resurrection nor the appearance of Jesus Christ but about the familiar and comforting image of Jesus as the good shepherd. The characterization of Jesus as the good shepherd has many dimensions. Still, the gospel reading of this Sunday reveals two of them: the relationship Jesus has with those who follow him and the relationship he has with the father.

Pope Francis seems to find this image instructive as well.

He says that the shepherd must "have the smell of the sheep." Having the smell of something indicates proximity and attentiveness to the otherness of something or someone. Jesus' sheep are those who hear his voice, recognize it, and follow him. Interestingly, the sheep always know the shepherd's voice because the shepherd and the sheep are always together. Still, not only do they recognize the shepherd's voice, but they also perceive the presence of other sheep. There is mutual trust between them. On the other hand, Jesus does not take the for granted the inner disposition of a shepherd. Some shepherds are like hired personnel- who does not claim ownership of his mission, nor risks his life for the sheep.

Consequently, in this discourse, Jesus makes three bold claims: He will lay down his life for his sheep and will not allow anyone to take them away from him; also, he has other sheep that do not belong to this fold which he must lead he must lead. In other words, the true shepherd wins the confidence of the sheep because he is ready to forgo his needs and deny his interest in the benefit of the sheep and the task of the sheep is to follow the shepherd. However, there are other sheep outside the contextual fold. Here Jesus refers to the missionary to the whole world. Here we remember the words of Jesus in which he said, "Thus it is written that the Messiah would suffer and rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance, for the forgiveness of sins, would be preached in his name to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem" (Lk. 24:46-47 NAB). Consequently, Jesus speaks of the inner life of the Church as well as the Church's missionary outreach.

In conclusion, this image of sheep and shepherd says something important about our relationship with Christ. Jesus wants to relate with us by attracting us. He does not want to force us to be with him, rather he wants us to trust him as a shepherd. Thus, he desires a relationship that is built on love. He wants us to see our faith in terms of gift and grace to we are invited to claim. Only in Jesus do we find the true model of shepherding.

Did you know... Hope is rising. Throughout scripture, there is evidence that we are called to be ambassadors of hope and healing. Did you know children of abuse long to hear this message of hope? Victims of crime, their families, and loved ones need to know that their voices are heard. Organizations throughout the nation are striving to share the message that He has risen and that there is hope. Each of us has a unique ability to support individuals who are hurting, to promote healthy relationships, and to build communities that are safe from those who may want to do harm. How has He called you to be an ambassador of hope and healing?

Did you know...The Catholic Church is deeply committed to protecting children from abuse and holding people accountable for inflicting such pain. In December 2021, the revised Book VI of the Code of Canon Law went into effect. This is the most recent of several documents that specifically address the issue of the abuse of children. Other documents include Vos estis lux mundi and Vademecum. These documents expand the acts which are considered abusive, clarify the manner in which the cases are processed, and hold people accountable for their action or inaction with regard to processing of a case. Of significant importance is attention given to the care of victimsurvivors and all who have been harmed. Bishops in the US lead the way for these changes with the implementation of the Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People 20 years ago. Today every diocese and eparchy must have in place systems for tending to those who have been harmed, protecting those in our care, and seeking restorative justice.
