Reflection for Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time Year B

Some time ago, a lady called me to pray in her office. It was strange since it was the first time I had such a call since my ministry in the USA. According to her, there seems to be an evil spirit present in her office. She explained some manifestations and happenings that sounded convincing that some evil forces were operating in the office. While in Africa, the invitation to pray against suspected evil spirits at people's homes, offices, stores, and farmlands was a frequent experience. But how does the evil spirit operate?

Some branches of psychiatry have claimed that evil spirit is an "archaic," first-century view of disease and that medical science can explain all these biblical descriptions in scientific terms. For example, psychiatry claims that people with schizophrenia hear voices or see things that aren't there and may even seem disconnected from reality or caught up in a different world. The movie "A Beautiful Mind (2001)" compellingly illustrates some of the principles of psychiatry and recovery from mental illness. While the movie is not entirely accurate about all life struggles, it does offer a representation of schizophrenia. Although mental illness and spiritual possession are different, many psychiatrists see belief in demonology as a culturally determined explanation for problems that can otherwise be fully explained in psychological or psychiatric terms.

To this end, psychiatry has not done justice to the dilemma in our world as regards disturbed minds and hearts. From the experience of my ministry, I am of the view that Satan does affect human beings and obstruct them with discernible bondages and harassment. I also believe these bondages can be broken, and the victims released and healed by the power of Christ. We must consider a truly holistic view of the human condition, which involves spiritual, psychological, social, and physical dimensions. In the Gospel this weekend, Jesus casts out evil spirits. In Jesus' time, evil spirits were believed to lead people from the right path, cause pain, or drive people to perform acts beyond their control. Consequently, the people feared evil spirits as much as they feared the evil perpetrated by the Romans. Therefore, evil had many names: Demon, Beelzebub, Prince of Devils, Satan, Dragon, Dominations, etc.

As Christians, we believe that the devil is the source of evil in the world. Whenever we encounter something that we cannot explain or understand, we often attribute it to the influence of the evil spirit. The demonic can influence us in many different ways, and it can be challenging to deal with its manifestations. There are many voices in the world that claim to have the solution to our problems, but the demons seem to persist.

In the Gospel, Jesus uses his authority to calm and drive out the evil spirit from a possessed man. This demonstrates Jesus' power over evil, and even the demons recognize his authority. Everyone in the story is amazed by Jesus' teaching, but the story never tells us what he is teaching. Instead, the focus is on Jesus' powerful expulsion of the demon.

Demonic possession is a spiritual problem that requires a spiritual solution. As Christians, we are called to speak with the authority of Christ against evil. We can do this by driving out the evil spirits of hatred, selfishness, and discrimination from our society and families through prayer and other acts of love and generosity.

DID YOU KNOW...? St. BLAISE

The Blessing of the Throats that take place on this day. Two candles are blessed, held slightly open, and pressed against the throat as the blessing is said. Many Catholics might remember Saint Blaise's feast day, February 3, because of the Blessing of the Throats that take place on this day. Two candles are blessed, held slightly open, and pressed against the throat as the blessing is said. **The Blessing of the Throats will take the place of the anointing of the sick usually held the first weekend of the month in February.**

Very few facts are known about Saint Blaise. It is believed he was a bishop of Sebastea in Armenia who was martyred under the reign of Licinius in the early fourth century. The legend of St. Blaise tells us that he was born into a rich and noble family who raised him as a Christian. He became a bishop. Later, a new persecution of Christians began. He received a message from God to go into the hills to escape persecution. Hunters discovered a cave surrounded by wild animals who were sick. Blaise walked among them unafraid, curing them of their illnesses.

The hunters recognized Blaise as a Bishop, so they captured him to take him back for trial. On the way back, he talked a wolf into releasing a pig that belonged to a poor woman. When Blaise was sentenced to be starved to death, the woman, in gratitude, sneaked into the prison with food and candles. Finally, the governor had Blaise killed.

Saint Blaise is the patron of physicians, sick cattle, wax- chandlers, wool combers, and of wild animals because of his care for them and of those with throat maladies. He is invoked against afflictions of the throat (Bentley, Roeder). (www.vaticansite.com/prayer-saint-blaise)
