Reflection for Easter Sunday

Happy Easter! Did you know that Easter is the greatest of all Sundays? It is the core mystery of our Christian faith.

A man, his wife, and his cranky mother-in-law went on vacation to the Holy Land. While they were there, the mother-in-law passed away.

The undertaker told them, "You can have her shipped home for \$5,000, or you can bury her here in the Holy Land for \$150." The man thought about it for a while and told the undertaker he would just have her shipped home. The undertaker asked, "Why.... why would you spend \$5,000 to ship your mother-in-law home when it would be wonderful to be buried here and spend only \$150?" The man said, "A man died here about 2000 years ago. He was buried here and three days later, he rose from the dead." "I just can't take that chance."

Which is more important to Christians, Christmas or Easter? Depending on the hierarchy of Christian essentials, the answer is arguable. Nonetheless, the two celebrations are part of the redemption narrative. At Christmas, the incarnation of Christ begins the story of the loving action of God, which came to its peak on the Cross. Therefore, the wood of the Cross becomes the transitional symbol of hope and power. St. Paul would say, "the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us, who are being saved, it is the power of God" (I Cor 1:18 NAB). This power of God is made manifest at the resurrection of Christ. If we reduce Easter to the metaphor of the spring event, we miss the meaning of the power of God. Easter reveals to us that life is stronger than death. It teaches us that love is more significant than hate or separation and that mercy overcomes judgment. When we gather at the bed of a dying loved one, the resurrection reminds us that this life's sufferings, pains, and difficulties are transient, though painful; for sure, they do not have the last word and cannot represent the final experience.

Easter is not just a celebration of the resurrection of Christ, which happened two thousand years ago. Rather, it celebrates our participation in Christ's resurrection through our baptism. Thus, Easter renews our faith in the resurrection of the dead and the new life to come. The empty tomb of Jesus challenges us and rallies our spirits. It points us to a living and presents God in every situation and every person. Therefore, our celebration of Easter renews our faith in God, who regularly breaks into our personal histories, challenge our assumptions and point us to something other than what we are familiar with. In other words, we see the triumph of God's power over our challenging experiences in the Easter story. Christ has risen, and the tomb remains empty.



Dear Friends in Christ,

As we celebrate the Resurrection of our Lord, I extend to each of you my wishes for a joyous Easter. I am remembering all the people of our diocese as I stand before the altar at Easter and assure you of my prayers asking that the Risen Lord will bless you abundantly.

I encourage each of us to allow the joy of Christ's victory over sin and death to fill our hearts, and then spread that joy when we greet one another with: "Happy Easter!" Like the first Christians who saw the empty tomb in Jerusalem and encountered the Risen Lord, let us spread the incredible news that Jesus shares his triumph with us so that we can live as God's children forever. May the Lord lift every burden or sadness in our hearts and fill all of us with his most incredible gift of peace. This is the day the Lord has made, let us rejoice and be glad!

DID YOU KNOW ...

April is Child Abuse Awareness Month

Child abuse comes in many forms. Most people identify child abuse as physically hitting a child. Neglect is also a form of abuse. Failing to provide a child with proper nutrition, housing, and supervision can cause irreparable harm. Expectations that a child be an active participant in the care of home and family, or even age-appropriate jobs is a part of healthy development. But excessive demands can cross into a form of servitude that is beyond societal norms. Child pornography is a form of sexual abuse, with real victims in every image. The viewing of these images is an offense against human dignity.

Child abuse can occur in every culture and every socioeconomic demographic. Peer-reviewed research, especially that of the past 30 years, repeatedly shows this to be true. This same research indicates that the vast majority of child abuse occurs at the hands of someone known to the victim. Those who seek to do harm to children will pursue opportunities that provide access to children and may even ingratiate themselves into the home. You can protect children by respecting the safe environment protocols established at youth-serving organizations. More importantly, you can implement many of these protocols in your home and be ever observant and vigilant in all public and private settings.
