Reflection for Pentecost Sunday

Four monks are being chased by a hungry Lion. As they run, they cry out to God yelling, "PLEASE LORD! CONVERT THIS LION TO BE A CHRISTIAN LION! "They run until they reach a dead end. The hungry lion approaches slowly, as they cry out louder: "PLEASE LORD HEAR OUR PRAYERS AND CONVERT HIM! "The lion stops walking, and the monks praise God believing that He answered their prayer. Suddenly the lion kneels down, puts his paws together and says: "Bless us, O Lord, and these, thy gifts, which we are about to receive through thy bounty, through Christ, our Lord, Amen."

Pentecost derives its origin from the Greek word Pentēkostē meaning "fiftieth". It refers to the Jewish Feast of Weeks (Ex 34:22), celebrated 50 days after the Passover (Deut 16:10), marking the wheat harvest's end. After the construction of the Temple in Jerusalem, the feast of Pentecost was transformed into a pilgrimage feast to celebrate God's covenant through the law given at Sinai. The Jews believed that God gave the ten commandments to Moses 50 days after the Passover. Consequently, they observed Pentecost day as a national holiday that brought everyone from all parts of the world together to offer sacrifices and give thanks to God for all His blessings.

Thus, the first reading this weekend narrates the experience of the early Christians in the context of the Pentecost celebration. They were overwhelmed by their experience of the Holy Spirit which came in the form of wind, tongues of fire, and in the gift of new languages. In the Christian tradition, the Pentecost event is the fulfillment of the promise of Christ to send the Holy Spirit upon the apostles. It also indicates the baptism of the Holy Spirit and the beginning of the church's mission to all nations.

In the gospel reading this weekend, Jesus appears to his disciples. He greets them with peace, breathes the spirit on them and gives them the mandate for the ministry of forgiveness. However, it is significant that Jesus does not primarily send them out to preach or heal or to teach. Rather, He sends them out to forgive. Moreover, Jesus understands that forgiveness is made possible by the power of the Holy spirit. It is the Holy spirit that teaches love, renews love and restores all brokenness. There is one more thing that Pentecost teaches us. God is still present, speaking, sending out disciples to make a difference, and calling people from different tongues, races, and cultures to be part of his mission.

The Holy Spirit is full of surprises, as is Jesus Christ. When the disciples of Jesus were locked in the room for fear of the Jews, He surprised them. He broke through their closed doors and shattered their fear and doubts. Yes! the Holy Spirit is full of surprises. Although relativism, secularism and affluence have tried to subdue the presence of God in our world, the Sprit still breaks in. Events have shown us that in our worst moments, the Spirit of God breaks through and restores hope. This is evident among men and women who still stand to support life and reject the culture of killing, whether through abortion or mass shooting. For example, the first responders damn every consequence and go out of their way to respond o distress calls even in dangerous neighborhood; we see it among physicians and researchers who work so hard to uphold God's option for life. The Holy Spirit transformed fearful apostles into courageous witnesses to Christ. Pentecost is the birthday of the Church and from this the age of the Church began.
